Clients at Putnam Family and Community Services now have a new, more welcoming space to greet them at the Carmel office that provides behavioral health services, including mental, social/emotional and substance use disorder treatment to people throughout the lower Hudson Valley.

The Carmel and Lake Mahopac Rotary Clubs made donations to PFCS last year to help renovate the waiting room at 1808 Route 6, to make it more professional and comfortable. After updating the flooring, replacing the furniture and fixtures and applying some fresh paint, the office debuted the new space last week.

"This is where we want to have our guests as comfortable as possible," said Debbie Levin, director of development for PFCS, to a room full of stakeholders who gathered Feb. 19 to see the renovation.

Chief Executive Officer Diane Russo thanked the Rotarians on behalf of the Board of Directors at PFCS, and on behalf of those who receive services. "I'm sorry we do not have before and after pictures, because it is just unbelievable," she said of the transformation.

Russo added that clients even participated in the renovation, as PFCS asked for suggestions and preferences during the design process. "We were able to get their input and we were able to create this great space," she said.

Also part of the big reveal was a mural that was painted by Cold Spring artist Dana Dalton, who donated her time and talent to the renovation.

In a sort of serendipitous occurrence, Dalton posted on social media one day that she would offer her talents, free of charge, to a non-profit organization that was looking for someone to provide an artistic touch to its offices. As PFCS was in the midst of its transformation, Levin reached out

"I thought, why not do what I love to do and provide what I can offer," Dalton explained of her volunteer offer.

She is also in the process of completing a volunteer project at a nursery school at Green Chimneys in Brewster.

The mural at PFCS took two days to complete. "We are hoping kids will interact with it," Dalton said of the large tree with sprawling branches, which received a coat of sealant so kids can touch it and the wall can be washed clean of handprints.

"The children love it," added Russo. "It's just beautiful."

Putnam Family and Community Services (PFCS) celebrated the completion of a much-needed facelift to its waiting area last Friday during a reception with the Lake Mahopac and Carmel Rotary clubs, the organizations that made the remodeling possible.

"It had been a long time since it had been updated," said Debbie Levin, director of development at Putnam Family and Community Services. "It needed paint. It had purple floors and the chairs were not appropriate for a service such as ours. It was not a welcoming and comfortable area for our people and our clients."

Before the remodel, Levin said the waiting area had a very institutional feel and because of the sensitive nature of the office's services it was a cause for concern. PFCS provides services that address mental health needs, substance abuse, as well as social and emotional issues that affect the community. However, PFCS is a nonprofit so any money that is raised goes directly

into its programs. Levin said the donated funds from the Rotary clubs were much needed and have made a huge difference.

Both Rotary clubs were on hand for the reception. Diane Russo, CEO of PCFS, and Christopher Dillon, chair of PCFS Board of Directors, gave short speeches.

"You would not believe the dif-

ference you have made in the lives of the people that come here," Russo said.

Tracey Walsh, president of the Lake Mahopac Rotary Club, said they were happy to assist.

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"They applied for one of our community-giving grants, met all of the qualifications, and we were more than happy to help because it's a very worthy cause and it helps folks in the community," she said.

The funds provided by the Rotary clubs made a huge difference in the space, Walsh said. The waiting area is now warm and inviting and features a soothing blue paint.
